
Parking in these spaces without a permit is illegal Flexischools and can lead to an on the spot fine.

#### **School Crossings**

At Hastings Primary School ALL students are expected to cross the road using the supervised school crossings.



The supervised crossing is there to help keep your children safe coming to and from school.

There are a few simple crossing rules to ensure everyone's safety. Please go through these rules with your children:

- 1. Stop at the yellow line painted on the path
- 2. Dismount bikes, scooters and skateboards
- 3. road and stop the traffic
- 4. You may cross after the whistle is blown

#### Did you know?

The speed zones around all schools are 2.30-4.00.

The program will commence next **Thursday 11th February 2021** and will run for the remainder of term 1.


#### **Medication**

Any student who needs medication during 2021 is required to have a current signed medical authority form or a current asthma plan.

Please contact the office if you student requires medication to ensure all correct paperwork is filled out.

#### Hastings Primary School goes nude!

No, not the students – our food! Students are now asked to bring **Nude Food** food without excess packaging to school. This reduces the amount of 'stuff' that needs to go in bins to be sent to landfill at our school.



So, whatever you don't eat or whatever is inedible will stay in the lunchbox and will come back home. Please remember to recycle whatever you can at home – recycling, crushable soft plastics and compost.







#### School procedures for the bushfire season

Fire danger ratings and warnings are used in Victoria to provide clear direction on the safest options for preserving life.

Schools and children's services listed on the DET Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR) will be closed on days declared by Fire Authorities as a Code Red fire danger day.

# Our school has been identified as being one of those at high bushfire risk and is listed on the BARR.

Where possible, we will provide parents with up to three days notice of a planned closure. We will contact you directly by letter with advice on planned closures and will confirm the decision to close by 12 noon the day before the planned closure. The communication process at our school will be:

A notice will be sent to all families as soon as we have notification of a Code Red Day. This may be up to 3 days in advance.

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, regardless of improvements in the weather forecast. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child.

It is also important to note that:

- No staff will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Code Red day.
- Out-of-school-hours care will also be cancelled on these days
- School camps will be cancelled if a Code Red fire danger rating day is determined for the Bureau of Meteorology district in which the camp is located.

On these Code Red days families are encouraged to enact their Bushfire Survival Plan – on such days children should never be left at home or in the care of older children.



For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Code Red days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Code Red day.

#### What can parents do?

- Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school is closed.
- Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.
- Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters and by talking to your child's teacher or any other member of the teaching staff about our emergency management plan.
- If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.

#### COVID – Update

Health and safety remains our number one priority and all students and parents should be aware of the following:

- Students are expected to attend school and access learning in classrooms
- Normal attendance protocols will be in operation

#### <u>Illness</u>

Do not come to school if you are exhibiting any of these symptoms:

- ♦ Fever
- ♦ Cough
- ♦ Fatigue
- ♦ Sore Throat
- Shortness of breath
- You should seek medical advice prior to returning to school
- Please do not come to school if you are unwell
- If students come to school and they are unwell they will be sent home

#### Hygiene and Physical Distancing

- Hand hygiene is an important part of returning to school
- Students are encouraged to regularly perform hand hygiene, including on arrival to school and before and after meals
- Washing hands with soap and water or the use of hand sanitiser is recommended throughout the school day
- Hand sanitiser will be provided in all learning spaces at the school
- Staff need to practise physical distancing 1.5m between themselves and other staff members or adults to the extent that is reasonably practicable. Staff should physically distance themselves from students where appropriate and feasible.

#### <u>Face masks</u>

- As per current DHHS guidelines anyone 12 years or older needs to carry a mask at all times
- Masks need to be worn by individuals aged 12 and over on public transport including school buses, unless you have a lawful exemption
- Face masks are RECOMMENDED where physical distancing of 1.5m cannot be maintained. On this

basis we encourage visiting adults and staff to wear masks in those classrooms or areas in the school where this applies.

- Masks must cover the nose and mouth
- Face coverings such as bandanas, scarves and face shields are not permitted

#### Hot weather recommendations re masks:

- Keep hydrated, drink water regularly
- Use single-use masks particularly cotton for increased breathability
- Replace them regularly and/or if they get wet
- Take mask breaks during the day

#### Contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case

- If you come into close contact with a confirmed case of coronavirus (COVID-19), you should selfquarantine for a period of 14 days
- DHHS defines 'close contact' as someone who has either:

- had at least 15 minutes of face-to-face contact with a confirmed case of coronavirus (COVID-19) - shared a closed space for more than two

- hours with someone who is a confirmed case
- In this situation the school should be notified immediately
- If you need to talk to someone about your symptoms or are seeking information, call the National Coronavirus Helpline for advice on 1800 020 080

#### PRIVACY COLLECTION STATEMENT – Primary Schools Information for parents and carers

During the ordinary course of your child's attendance at our school, school staff will collect your child's personal and health information when necessary to educate your child, or to support your child's social and emotional wellbeing or health in the school context. Such information will also be collected when required to fulfil a legal obligation, including duty of care, anti-discrimination law and occupational health and safety law. If that information is not collected, the school may be unable to provide optimal education or support to your child, or fulfil those legal obligations.

For example, health information may be collected through the school nurse, primary welfare officer or wellbeing staff member. If your child is referred to a specific health service at school, such as a Student Support Services officer, the required consent will be obtained. Our school also collects information provided by parents and carers through the School Entrance Health Questionnaire (SEHQ) and the Early Childhood Intervention Service (ECIS) Transition Form.

Our school may use online tools, such as apps and other software, to effectively collect and manage information about your child for teaching and learning purposes, parent communication and engagement; student administration; and school management purposes. When our school uses these online tools, we take steps to ensure that your child's information is secure. If you have any concerns about the use of these online tools, please contact us.

School staff will only share your child's personal or health information with other staff who need to know to enable the school to educate or support your child, or fulfil a legal obligation.

When our students transfer to another Victorian government school, personal and health information about that student will be transferred to that next school. Transferring this information is in the best interests of our students and assists that next school to provide optimal education and support to students.

In some limited circumstances, information may be disclosed outside of the school (and outside of the Department of Education and Training). The school will seek your consent for such disclosures unless the disclosure is allowed or mandated by law.

Our school values the privacy of every person. When collecting and managing personal and health information, all school staff must comply with Victorian privacy law. Throughout this notice, 'staff' includes principals, teachers, Student Support Service officers, youth workers, social workers, nurses and any other allied health practitioners and all other staff at our school. This includes employees, agents and service providers (contractors) of the Department, whether paid or unpaid.

#### **Camps Sports and Excursions Fund**

Every Victorian child should have access to the learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom.

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF) is provided by the Victorian Government to ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities.

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the outdoors; excursions encourage a deeper under-standing of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

The Department of Education and Training administers the CSEF to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities. Although administratively the fund is received through the school, the full amount is intended for the benefit of the eligible student. On the first day of term one (27 January 2021) or the first day of term two (19 April 2021), a parent or legal guardian of a student must be an eligible beneficiary of one of these cards:

Veterans Affairs Gold Card; Centrelink ٠ Health Care Card; Pensioner Concession Card

If you applied for the CSEF at your child's school in 2020, you do not need to complete an application form in 2021 unless there has been a change in your family circumstances.

Your child's school will apply for the CSEF on your behalf. You will only need to submit an application form in 2021 if any of the following changes have occurred:

- new student enrolments: your child has ۲ started or changed schools in 2021 or you did not apply at the same school in 2020
- changed family circumstances: such as a ٠ change of custody, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2021.

Schools are able to accept and process applications up until the end of term two each year.

In 2021 the CSEF will be allocated to the camp for students in grades 3-6 and excursions/incursion for students in P-2.

Students are learning:


to understand the difference betweengrowth mindset and a fixed mindset,
