ANZAC Day 25th April

Last week our student leaders spoke in assembly about the significance of ANZAC Day.



This presentation was filmed and uploaded to our Facebook page. The school leaders, along with many other students and staff, represented Hastings Primary School at the ANZAC Day service in Hastings.

Our school leaders, Charlotte Fenton and Dylan Malloy, laid a wreath on our behalf.

ANZAC Day is an important national occasion and a time to remember the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during WWI.

ANZAC Day marks the anniversary of the Gallipoli Campaign of WWI. ANZAC is an acronym for Australia and New Zealand Army Corps.

At dawn on the 25th of April 1915, soldiers rowed ashore in boats called 'lighters' during the Gallipoli landings, under fire and without outboards motors

Traditionally, Rosemary is worn on ANZAC Day. Rosemary is found growing wild on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

Student Leaders - ANZAC Assembly Presentation

Anzac Day is one of Australia's most important national occasions. It has been commemorated since 1916. We commemorate rather than celebrate Anzac day because we are remembering something that is important but also has sad feelings for many people.

Anzac Day is held on the 25th of April and it marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.

ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces became known as Anzacs.

Anzac Day commemorates Australia's involvement in World War 1 and remembers anyone who has served in a war or conflict as well as those men and women serving in the Defence forces today.

Anzac Day is a time at which Australians reflect on the many different meanings of war.

Anzac Day is a day to remember the servicemen and women who are serving our country today.

Anzac Day is a day for those who have served in war and conflicts to share their experiences and remember their mates who were lost.

Anzac Day is a day for families to remember the people from their family who have been killed at war.

Anzac Day is a day for us to acknowledge the sacrifices service men and women have made for Australia.

Anzac Day is a day to remember what happened in the past so we make sure it doesn't happen again.

On Anzac day we observe a minute's silence as a sign of respect and a time for reflection. During this time we should be silent to show our respect. We should stand still and not fidget or talk. Some people like to bow their head.

On Anzac Day after the minute's silence we say "Lest we forget" which reminds us that we must not forget.

WE WANT OUR STUDENTS TO TELL US WHAT THEY THINK!

We value student voice as a means to improving student engagement, wellbeing, and quality instruction, and are conducting a survey to find out what your child thinks of our school.

The AtoSS is an annual student survey offered by the Department of Education and Training to assist our school to gain an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school.

Students will be asked about their thoughts and feelings in relation to their school, their learning, peer relationships, bullying and life in general.

Students from Year 4 to 6 at our school will participate in the survey. Your child will complete the survey online during school hours using a purpose built secure online survey tool. It is important to note that we are not in any way "testing" your child. Your child has the right to refuse or withdraw from the survey at any time.

Your child will be provided with a unique login to complete the survey. The student login is an <u>assigned identifier</u> that may be used to link data for statistical and research purposes only.

All responses to the survey are kept anonymous in the response file. Personal identification data will not be recorded in the survey response file. This ensures that the confidentiality of your child's responses is protected at all times.

This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school over the period Tuesday 4th – Friday 7th May 2021. The survey takes around 20-45 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time.

The survey results will be reported back to the school in an aggregate form throughout the survey period. All survey data that is made available in reports are for groups of students only so that no individual student can be identified. Data suppression rules are used for schools with low student numbers per year level.

Last year we used the survey results to plan to increase opportunities for student voice, to inform our planning of wellbeing curriculum, and the way we support students to problem solve.

Mobile Phones

In 2020 a new mobile phone policy was released for all government schools. The policy means phones brought to school must be switched off and stored securely during the school day.

The aim of this policy is to provide:

- a safe environment to learn without inappropriate mobile phone use (including cyberbullying) or distractions
- greater opportunities for social interaction and physical activity during recess and lunchtimes.

At Hastings Primary School students with a mobile phone are responsible for bringing their phone to the office for secure storage upon arrival at school. Their phone should be switched off to ensure that it is secure. Students can then collect their phone at the end of the day from the office, and once they have left the school ground can turn the device on.

In emergencies, parents can contact their children through the school office.

Respectful Relationships

Social and emotional development is a continual focus at HPS, with respect being a key focus for staff, students and our community. This term the topic focus in classrooms is 'Problem-solving skills'.

Problem-solving skills are important to how we cope with challenges. The classroom program provides a number of learning activities to develop students' skills. The activities in the program assist students to develop their critical and creative thinking, and to apply them to scenarios exploring personal, social and ethical dilemmas.

Restorative Room

You may have heard about the 'Restorative Room' at Hastings Primary School and be wondering what it is all about.

When students have a problem that is too big to handle on their own they are invited to the Restorative Room to have a discussion that is guided by a teacher so that they can learn to manage social challenges and resolve conflicts.

These conversations require that all students involved in a problem attend, so that all sides are explored and understood. Together the students will decide on the appropriate resolution to repair any relationships that may have been damaged during these problems, with the teacher guiding students to work respectfully.

After a visit to the Restorative Room, a note will come home to inform families that their child has worked through a problem, and may be keen to discuss it at home for additional support.
