What's in a Name? Student Voice Creates Change!

Last year the Year 5 House leaders approached me with a proposal to change the names for our House teams in an attempt to make them more inclusive. The students recognised that the long-standing house names were historically based around white male explorers, after Australia had been settled.

The student group advocated we select native plants as the theme for the new house teams and to also utilise the plants indigenous names. The student group then sought feedback from the student cohort, staff and broader community. Once the new house names were decided, the students then conducted a design competition giving all students the opportunity to have input in new signage.

Jump forward nearly 12 months and we now have our new house names; *Murmbal, Bunya, Warada and Wallum*. Our new signage has been installed [see pictures] and speaking directly to the now Year 6 students who 'got the ball rolling' we can see how proud they feel about effecting change in their learning environment.

<u>Cancer Council - Daffodil Day in</u> <u>memory of Mrs Gillard</u>




Student of The Week
