
FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions



Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for noncurriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

FROM THE AP'S DESK

TENGLISH AT H.P.S (PART 3)

In the last newsletter I broke down the key elements of phonics and defined some words. This week I will answer: "What might a phonics lesson at school look like?"

Phonics is often taught using visual (sight) auditory (hearing), and tactile (touching) methods (e.g., saying sounds, tracing letters)

At Hastings Primary School we use Sounds Write as our Systematic Synthetic Phonics program. Our lessons incorporate; **Daily practice** of: high frequency words, the Sounds Write unit 'code'

Dictation: The teacher reads a sentence that includes taught sounds or spelling patterns aloud and students practice spelling and writing the sentence.

Choral Reading: Choral reading is reading in unison, like a chorus, with the teacher taking the lead. It is highly efficient because all students practice at the same time and it assists to build fluency

PHONICS AT HOME

Learning to read takes time, encouragement and support, and each young person progresses at their own pace. It's important to celebrate small achievements in progress, and encourage children to keep trying, even when it's challenging for them. When children enjoy learning, they are more likely to stay motivated, which helps them develop a strong foundation in reading. Making phonics practice fun is key to keeping children engaged and motivated.

Kitahan Halpara

Kitchen Helpers

Involve your child in cooking or baking. Let them measure ingredients using cups, spoons, and a kitchen scale.

Talk about how many teaspoons make a tablespoon or compare weights of ingredients.

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Measurement Scavenger Hunt

Set a list of items to find, like "something that weighs less than a book." / "something that can hold 20 pencils." / "a bowl that can hold 6 apples."

Discuss how they determined the measurements!

Bath Time Capacity Fun

Use different-sized containers to explore how much water each can hold.

Ask questions like, "How many small cups does it take to fill the big one?"
